


Community Project Criteria

 - Capable community partner?






















Key Allocated Items:

- Immediate Needs Grants -\$3.0 million
- Public Safety Incremental Pay - \$2.3 million
- Natural Resources Water Projects - \$1.98 million
- Broadband Partnerships -\$1.8 million

Pending Direction:

- \$10 million for Behavioral Health Phase 2
- \$4.8 million for Community Projects






Allocated Item:

 Parklane Mobile Home Park - \$1 million

Pending BOCC Direction:

Community Projects





Allocated Items:

- CJA Facilities Projects -\$2.7 million
- CJA Operational Revenue Shortfall - \$1 million
- Carter Lake Swim Beach -\$610K

Pending Direction:

- Community Projects \$22.1 million
- Additional Broadband Projects - \$10 million



Broadband Update

- County requires \$250M in project funding to solve our broadband problem (95% of residences)
- Community owned utility provides the lowest cost for the community and protects future needs
- SLFRF investments in broadband projects provide a financial return over time to Larimer County
 - Revenue from service fees can pay back our investment in 30 years at a 35% take rate
- Broadband impacts many areas of our community (economic, education, medicine, emergency management, climate and sustainability, etc)



Broadband Funding Update

- Infrastructure & Jobs Act (IIJA): Allows SLFRF funds as match
 - Colorado estimated to receive \$500M-\$700M
 - Consider setting aside additional matching funds for future IIJA state broadband grants
- Capital Projects Fund: Allows support for critical broadband infrastructure projects
 - Colorado will receive \$162M in grant funds
 - County will request support for middle mile projects



Broadband Update -Board Direction

- Direction sought: Allocate additional \$10.2 million to Broadband Projects (\$12 million total)
 - Consider additional funds to prioritize projects in areas that struggle with affordable internet access (\$18M)
 - Consider reserving 10% matching funds for IIJA grant proposals (\$8M)
- Compete for other state and federal programs to support our strategic plan

County capital support for last mile projects can be recovered over time.



Behavioral Health Phase 2

- Potential acceleration of campus Phase 2
- Adolescent service expansion
- Partnership with CSU on "Center of Excellence"
- Intention to apply for State ARPA funding with expected local match
- Estimate County ARPA/FRF contribution of up to \$10M

- Deadline to submit is April 30th
- Covered January March 2022
- Criminal Justice Alternatives and Sheriff's Office Payroll costs still be calculated

Immediate Needs Grants Update

- Immediate Needs Grant Progress:
 - 53 grants awarded
 - \$3,046,204 in funding awarded
 - 51 of 53 grant agreements completed*
 - 35 reimbursements requested*
 - 3 of 3 up-front funding issued*
 - \$1 million in funding disbursed*
 - 15 projects fully reimbursed*

Federal Legislative Update

- COVID funding bill
 - Includes \$10 billion for vaccines, therapeutics, diagnostics & other medical costs
 - Includes S. 3011/H.R. 5735 allows ARPA funds to be used for infrastructure & natural disaster recovery; requires Local Assistance & Tribal Consistency Funds (LATCF) to go to Payment in Lieu of Taxes (PILT) counties.
 - Authorizes U.S. Treasury Department to allocate LATCF
 - Reduces LATCF by 43%
 - Bill has stalled due to unrelated immigration issue



Next Steps

- Next quarterly Project & Expenditure Report due to U.S. Treasury Department on April 30
- Monitor Federal legislation
- Second tranche of ARPA FRF to be received in or after May
- Next monthly work session May 18th, 2022
