Further, this Notice does not contain ballot issues for those jurisdictions conducting separate elections. A separate Notice will be mailed to the appropriate voters within the jurisdictions conducting an election by mail or polling place. Voters may receive additional materials from other jurisdictions conducting independent elections.

A Coordinated Election will be held on Tuesday, November 7, 2023, between the hours of 7 AM and 7 PM.

The election will be conducted as a mail ballot election. Ballot materials will be mailed during the week of October 16, 2023, to every active, registered voter.

Voted ballots may be returned by mail (postage is 66 cents) or hand delivered to a designated ballot drop box location or a Voter Service and Polling Center.

After October 30, 2023, it is recommended that voters personally deliver their ballot to any of the drop box or Voter Service and Polling Center locations listed in the following pages of this Notice.

Ballots must be RECEIVED at the Larimer County Elections Office, a designated ballot drop box location or a Voter Service and Polling Center by 7 PM on Election Day, Tuesday, November 7, 2023.

Ballots received after 7 PM on Election Day will not be counted. **Postmarks do not count as a received date.**

SHALL LOVELAND RURAL FIRE PROTECTION DISTRICT TAXES BE INCREASED \$1,900,000 IN THE FIRST FULL FISCAL YEAR, BEGINNING IN TAX COLLECTION YEAR 2024 AND ANNUALLY THEREAFTER, BY THE IMPOSITION OF AN ADDITIONAL AD VALOREM PROPERTY TAX OF UP TO 2.478 MILLS, FOR GENERAL OPERATING, MAINTENANCE AND CAPITAL PURPOSES INCLUDING:

- PROVIDING STAFFING, EQUIPMENT AND TRAINING TO ADDRESS WILDFIRES AND REDUCE WILDFIRE RISK THROUGHOUT THE DISTRICT,
- HIRING NEW FIREFIGHTERS,
- FUNDING CAPITAL IMPROVEMENTS, INCLUDING THE FIREFIGHTER TRAINING CENTER:

Summaries of written comments filed with the election officer:

The following summaries were prepared from comments filed by persons FOR Ballot Issue

Please Vote Yes on Issue 6B on the November ballot to support the Loveland Fire Rescue Authority (LFRA). This measure will support LFRA's efforts to keep our community safe and support our firefighters by reducing wildfire risk, hiring additional staff, and improving aging training facilities.

The Loveland Fire Rescue Authority combines leadership and funding from two different iurisdictions—the Loveland Rural Fire Protection District and the City of Loveland. The rural coverage area stretches from the Big Thompson Canyon in the west to east of Interstate 25 and the Johnstown area.

The Loveland Rural Fire Protection District Ballot Issue 6B is paired with Issue 2F in the City of Loveland, which also seeks a tax increase to fund the same priorities for the LFRA. It's critical that both Loveland Rural Fire Protection District and City of Loveland voters approve issues 6B and 2F so that LFRA can protect our communities and support its firefighters.

The LFRA serves more than 109,000 residents in the city and rural areas, which swells during the year with tourists and outdoor enthusiasts. As Loveland and the surrounding region experience significant growth, the employees, volunteers, and staff at LFRA continue to provide exceptional emergency response and fire mitigation and prevention services, however it is becoming increasingly difficult to keep up with the growing need. Since 2012 the full-time population of the region served has increased 18 percent and call volume has increased by 66 percent. With more people in our area, threats from fire and other emergencies are growing. The dedicated employees of LFRA are depended on and are continually asked to do more.

A strategic plan was completed by LFRA to identify and address numerous challenges: population growth, increased threats from wildfires, staffing for emergencies and prevention, and equipment and facility needs. Based on feedback from internal and external stakeholders, Issue 6B was developed to address necessary improvements to general operations including:

- Providing staffing, equipment and training to address wildfires and reduce wildfire risk;
- · Hiring new firefighters to address staffing shortages; and
- Funding capital improvements across the LFRA, including the firefighter training center.

By continuing to invest in community fire protection, Loveland Fire Rescue Authority will be able to maintain the high levels of service experienced today. Issue 6B is a is a 2.478 mill levy for prevention, operations and training and would cost about \$84 per year—about \$7 per month—for a \$500,000 home value within the Loveland Rural Fire Protection District. If approved by voters, the Loveland Rural Fire Protection District mill levy will still be less than neighboring districts, including Wellington Fire Protection District, Berthoud Fire Protection District and Front Range Fire Rescue.

Voting Yes on Issue 6B will allow the Loveland Fire Rescue Authority to ensure that it continues to meet or exceed your expectations of service, that their staff and volunteers are kept safe through proper training and equipment, and that our community is prepared for the future. Please vote yes on Issue 6B
