# Larimer County Immediate Needs Grant

## Philosophy & Mission

- Mission: Teaching Tree Early Childhood Learning Center provides quality, affordable, early childhood care for families of all socio-economic and cultural backgrounds. Our children are our future; the growth of each child must be considered on an individual basis. We believe in supporting families and strengthening our community by providing a safe, nurturing and supportive education for our children.
- Who we are and what we do:
  - Provide quality child care for low- and middle-income families in Larimer County (county's largest non profit child care provider)
  - Provide a safe and stimulating environment for children year long, while parents work or attend school, supporting their self-sufficiency goals
  - Prepare children for school and lifelong success, ages 6 weeks-5
  - Centers in Loveland and Fort Collins
  - Serve approximately 400 children each year

## **Grant Impact**

- Teaching Tree received \$97,448 to fund classroom cohorting in 2022
- What is classroom cohorting?
  - Implemented cohorting in the early days of COVID in May 2020
  - Keeping classrooms together and not combining in the morning or afternoon
  - This helped to keep classrooms safe and open, per Health Department regulations
    - Decreased the spread of COVID throughout classrooms
    - Decreased classroom closures due to exposure
  - By keeping classrooms open, it allowed parents to have the childcare they need, so they are able to work more consistently



# **Grant Impact**



- When COVID began, adjusted hours to 8:00-5:00 due to limited funding and staffing
  - Moved to 7:00-5:30 to adjust to needs of our families in January 2021
  - Did not have funding to open back up at pre-COVID hours (6:30-6:00) due to health concern with keeping 15 classrooms open for 11.5 hours per day
- The Larimer County funding allowed us to continue cohorting classrooms and extend our hours to 6:00pm daily

### 2022 Statistics

- 433 students served at both centers
- 170 low-income families supported by scholarship funding
- \$242,075 in scholarships provided to families
- 5 of 15 classrooms closed from January-February due to COVID outbreaks (0 after February)
  - Closures were 3-5 days max, typically one classroom at a time
- Allowed 795 caregivers to work or attend school
